Introduction

Portfolio Holder Statement

As the Cabinet portfolio holder for Economy and Partnerships I am proud to say that the Area Action Partnerships fall within my remit.

AAPs have been supporting work in local communities for 15 years now. Funding has helped to sustain and develop numerous local organisations right across County Durham. Nearly £30m has been allocated through Area Budget grants since AAPs were created back in 2009 supporting nearly 3000 different applications.

The 14 AAPs cover the whole of the county, each with effective boards of 21 people which are made up of partners, public, councillors and agencies. The Boards work on their specific priorities that reflect the needs of the county's varied localities. Over the last year they have again allocated nearly £2M which has supported over 190 local projects.

Fellow County Councillors and I are very grateful for the support we get from the AAPs in allocating our Neighbourhood Budget. This is funding every councillor gets to support good causes and projects in the areas we represent. Since 2009 over £37m has been allocated through nearly 8000 different applications. You can imagine the difference funding via the AAPs and Councillors has made to our towns, villages and city. This year councillors have supported well over 600 projects with over £2.4M of funding.

At a time when communities and families are having to deal with ongoing financial pressures AAPs have been able to help those organisations who are helping others. The strength of the voluntary and community sector in County Durham never fails to amaze me.

I do want to take this opportunity to thank everyone who gives up their time and volunteers with local organisations. Be that with sports clubs, management committees at community centres, environmental schemes or those people who volunteer on AAP Boards. County Durham would be a poorer place without you. However volunteering has to be supported and it's a key area that AAPs help with in terms of supporting groups with volunteer management, training and support.

There is no doubt that community organisations are struggling through the ongoing cost of living crisis so if you have ever thought about volunteering now could be the time. Local organisations give so much to their communities and they do need our help.

Since 2009 AAPs have been a feature of our communities but change is ahead. Last year the council concluded a review of its community engagement activities which included the AAPs. The outcomes of this review are now being implemented and this is going to lead to enhancements in 2025 with AAPs being replaced by new 'Local Networks'. The Local Networks will continue to bring local people, councillors and organisations together building on the legacy of the AAPs with the aim of broadening the reach within communities and developing Local Network Plans setting out the longer-term aspirations for our many towns and villages. Over the coming months we will keep people updated as we develop Local Network structures.

Prior to the launch of Local Networks in 2025, AAPs will continue to deliver over the next year which will only be possible with the hard work of all involved. So a big thank you from me to fellow councillors, AAP Board members, partner organisations, members of the public and the AAP staff. I look forward to continuing to work with you all over the next 12 months.

Established in 2009, Great Aycliffe & Middridge Partnership brings together local people and partners to take action on local issues. Areas covered include the whole of Great Aycliffe, Middridge and the villages of Woodham, Aycliffe Village and School Aycliffe.

Over the last year, the key focus has been on an overarching 'Community Recovery' priority. Over £119k has been allocated to local organisations to help tackle local issues.

County Councillors provided funding towards a community Christmas Event with Newton Aycliffe Police, with an amazing grotto, Christmas crafts and games, and gifts from Santa and Mrs Claus! This was a free event open to all, helping families to experience the magic of Christmas, whilst also raising money to support local residents across the town.

The Difference We Have Made





Groundwork North East & Cumbria secured a grant through GAMP's Area Budget to help fund their 'Community Social' project - a social club for local residents, welcoming all ages.

The group provides 2 weekly sessions in 2 locations across the area, in an effort to tackle social isolation and loneliness. The group offers refreshments, fun activities and advice on services residents may find helpful. Project workers also provide free cooking workshops encouraging healthy eating, and advice on how to budget.

"What I love about coming here everyone is so friendly and helpful, I hope it continues" said one attendee, "I can sit and talk with friends and get to know my neighbours better." People of all ages, both men and women, are attending sessions. The atmosphere is relaxed and the conversation flows freely. Workers are on hand to mix and mingle and bring the group together.



Five Acres Outdoor Triking

Five Acres secured a grant to support the organisation to purchase specialist trikes as part of their outdoor activity programme, making sessions accessible and inclusive to all attendees.

Five Acres is a day respite and development facility for individuals aged from 16yrs with special educational needs and disabilities. They have a huge focus on outdoor learning and activities and have purchased some outdoor equipment with funding which has enabled them to take their 'champions' further afield on outdoors trikes.

The organisation provides champions with the best possible development activities and are now seeing a massive success and improvement in their health and wellbeing, with more physical outdoor activities being provided with the addition of the new equipment.



Pioneering Care Partnership Community Lunch Club

The Pioneering Care Partnership has benefited from GAMP funding for their Lunch Club project. Due to the increasing cost-of-living and issues around social isolation post-covid, the Centre was keen to deliver a social-based session where residents could meet on a regular basis.

The project delivers 4 x 8-week courses delivered through a weekly lunch club, aimed at supporting residents within the GAMP area. The Lunch Club brings together individuals on Wednesday afternoons between 1.00 pm - 3.00 pm, providing a 2-course meal and $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours of activities aimed at building confidence, resilience, and developing skills and knowledge through a range of activities.

Each 8-week course includes sessions delivered by qualified tutors: mindfulness, physical activity, and healthy eating on a budget. Additionally seasonal activities and taster sessions run throughout the year including, i.e. Christmas Wreath Making, Easter Crafts, Gardening etc.

The Difference We Have Made



Aycliffe Business Park Community Limited **Project ASPIRE**

Aycliffe Business Park Community Limited have been awarded £10,000 for a Community Business Park project, which will see the 2 local secondary schools attend businesses on site.

Project ASPIRE (Aycliffe Schools Partnership in Recruitment & Engagement) will shine a light on the range of career opportunities Aycliffe Business Park has to offer, as well as engaging and building stronger and sustainable relationships between local schools and businesses on the Park.

150 pupils from each school will take part in a "Business Safari" - pupils will visit the host companies, facilitated by senior staff in each business, to include a tour, Q&A session, and an opportunity for follow-up.

The first visit proved positive with participating businesses who are keen to engage with the second group due in June. Pupils expressed their enjoyment and commented how insightful the visits had been.
