### The entrepreneurs of tomorrow

Young entrepreneurs were put to the test in a competition that gives schoolchildren a fascinating insight into the world of business.

The theme of this year's County Durham Future Business Magnates was 'What a wonderful world – can you make it better?', and Year 8 pupils from across the county took part.

The overall winner was King James I Academy in Bishop Auckland, with

pupils impressing the judges with their 'Smart Weigh' business. The ingenious concept is based on an eco-friendly bin that can weigh food waste, with users then earning points according to how much of the waste is recycled or composted.

Now in its 19th year, County Durham Future Business Magnates is organised by our business support service, Business Durham.

# Support with childcare

If your two-year-old child has been receiving 15 hours of free childcare through the Government's funding for Working Parents scheme, they will automatically switch to 30 hours when they turn three.



Parents and carers who are still eligible just need to continue reconfirming their code as normal and it will become usable to claim 30 hours (the code will remain the same).

If your child is accessing a Play and Learn two-year-old funded place, they will continue to receive 15 hours of childcare when they turn three.

# Wendy crowned Durham Tourism Superstar 2024

Initially joining Kynren as a volunteer in 2016, Wendy has given

up hundreds of hours of her own time to make the production a success. Eight years on and she is now an employed member of the team, working closely with the production's 1,000 volunteers to ensure the show runs smoothly. "It feels amazing to win, I didn't expect it at all, but it is fantastic," said Wendy. "It is a celebration of all we do at Kynren."

Wendy will now go forward as Visit County Durham's nomination for the VisitEngland and Mirror Travel National Tourism Superstar contest.



### Calling all artists!

Artists who live and/or work in County Durham are invited to submit their work for potential display at Bishop Auckland Town Hall's Open Art Exhibition.

A celebration of local talent and creativity and hosted in the venue's gallery, last year's exhibition showcased 186 pieces of artwork with drawings, paintings, textiles, sculpture, digital art and photography on display.

Artists – including young artists aged 12 to 18 – can submit their artwork until 5pm on **Tuesday 1 October**.

### **Apply for 2025 school places**

Applications are now open for primary and secondary school places for the 2025/26 school year.

Parents and carers of children turning five between 1 **September 2025** and 31 August 2026 must complete an online application stating which school they would like their child to attend.

Parents whose child attends the nursery unit attached to their preferred school or has a sibling at the school still need to apply. They should also apply for a place in Year 3 if their child attends an infant school which operates separately to their preferred junior school.

Primary school applications close at midnight on **Wednesday 15 January 2025**.

Secondary school applications are also open and close at midnight on **Thursday 31 October**.

# Tourism delivers major economic boost

Tourism contributed £1.23 billion to County Durham's economy in 2023, with new attractions playing a key role in helping the county reach a new record.

The latest industry figures demonstrate the county has continued to build on the success of 2022, when it hit the £1 billion milestone for the first time.

Overall, just over 20 million people visited the county last year, an increase of 12.5 per cent. The number of people employed in tourism has also grown, up by 12.4 per cent to 13,178.

### Make the move to Universal Credit

Anyone receiving legacy benefits must make the switch to Universal Credit by December 2025.

The Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) is currently issuing Managed Migration Notices to people who are claiming legacy benefits, namely:

- Working Tax Credit
- Income based Jobseekers Allowance
- Child Tax Credit
- Income based Employment and Support Allowance
- Income Support
- Housing Benefit

The notice explains that legacy benefits will end, and that people must make a claim for Universal Credit within three months of receiving the letter.

People will not be automatically transferred and so could be financially worse off if their claim to Universal Credit is late.

In some circumstances, a time extension may be possible due to personal circumstances. This can be requested by calling the number in the letter within the three-month time

period specified.

There is still time to have your say on the provision of information, advice and guidance services across County Durham.

In addition to the services provided by our own Welfare Rights Team, we commission local charities to give free, confidential and impartial advice and support to residents on a range of issues and topics.

Citizens Advice County Durham, Age UK, Durham Carers, East Durham Trust, Durham Foodbank and Community Money Advice are just some of the organisations we work with.

To ensure we continue to meet people's needs, this summer, we launched a consultation seeking views on how these services can be delivered in the future.

With a hoist, changing table, height adjustable sink and shower, the toilet is perfect for families with additional needs and carers accompanying visitors to the park.

# Promoting safe travel to school

# New bridge to be installed on historic monument

New concept designs have revealed what a proposed new bridge along an historic railway line could look like.

As part of the continued development of the Stockton and Darlington Railway (S&DR) Walking and Cycling Route, we are proposing to build a new bridge deck over the abutments of the Gaunless Bridge in West Auckland.

Opened in 1825, the Gaunless Bridge was located on the S&DR serving Witton Park Colliery. It was one of the first railway bridges in the world to be constructed from iron.

The current proposals are part of wider plans to promote and improve the whole S&DR route for 2025, the 200th anniversary of the railway.

A consultation event about the bridge took place over the summer where local residents and interested parties expressed their support for the proposals.



### Crematoriums retain Green Flag status

Mountsett Crematorium and Durham Crematorium have been recognised for their excellent facilities, high standards of maintenance and calming environments.

Once again, both sites have been awarded a Green Flag, an international award that recognises well-managed parks and green spaces.

We maintain both sites, with Durham Crematorium run in partnership with Spennymoor Town Council and Mountsett Crematorium in conjunction with Gateshead Council.

A revamped Louisa Centre is offering visitors of all ages a range of fun activities and updated facilities.


The centre now boasts a larger children's soft play area where toddlers can enjoy their own dedicated space and older children can problem-solve their way through three levels of obstacles.

### **County Durham Youth Awards**





### Jay Jenkins, Outstanding Award

Twelve-year-old Jay was born deaf and registered as sight-impaired at the age of four. He has dealt with varying health conditions throughout his life, including type 1 diabetes.

He was recently diagnosed with Wolfram-Like Syndrome, a rare condition which links hearing, sight loss and diabetes, as well as Sweet Syndrome, a very rare inflammatory skin condition.

Despite the challenges he has faced, including having to get blood tests every two weeks, Jay was nominated by a friend for teaching him sign language, always catching up on any work he has missed due to health appointments and taking part in fundraisers.

Jay was also presented with the **Anne Jackson Award**, an additional accolade created in memory of Anne, a supporter of the Youth Council, which recognises those who show a special commitment to others.

Young people across County Durham who have made a positive difference to the lives of others have been celebrated at our County Durham Youth Awards.

The awards, now in their fourth year and hosted by our Youth Council, celebrate the achievements of young people and youth advocates from right across the county.

Put forward by their peers, teachers, parents, and members of the community, many of our winners have gone 'above and beyond' in the face of some significant personal challenges...



### Leia Easby, Outstanding Award

Leia's 11-year-old brother had been very poorly for a while but his death was sudden and unexpected.

When the family left hospital, 14-year-old Leia's parents received a box of items in his memory, yet nothing was given to her. Disheartened, she did not want other young people to experience the same.

So, to help other young people with the process of losing a loved one, Leia has been creating boxes to give to children which contain items to help them deal with bereavement.



### Imogen Rhodes, Junior Superstar

Imogen, aged just seven, has Hypoplastic Left Heart Syndrome, a complex heart condition which significantly impacts how she manages day to day activities.

Imogen recently had her third heart surgery and missed months of school to recover from this. She wrote her own stories whilst in hospital and completed home-schooling during her recovery period.

Now back at South Stanley Junior School, Imogen is a regular fundraiser for the Children's Heart Unit Fund.





### Beatrice Morrell, Junior Superstar

Eleven-year-old Beatrice had to contend with repeated infections and pneumonia in the autumn of 2023, and had to take more than a month off school. She is currently on the waiting list for a tonsillectomy.

Yet she has still managed to raise money for Muhoroni People's Foundation, which helps families in Kenya have access to healthcare and facilities.

She has raised £800 for the foundation to date by swimming 13 kilometres in 13 days.

### **Community Action Team**

### A team on a mission!

Blitzing neighbourhood problems is all in a day's work for our Community Action Team.

They're a "boots on the ground" bunch who travel round the county finding and fixing the issues that matter most to local people.

It's all part of our Community Action Scheme - here's how it works...

### The plan of action

The team typically spends 11 weeks in each area it visits.

Weeks 1 and 2: This is the factfinding stage. Team members hit the streets, talking to local people and businesses to find out about the problems they'd like the team to sort out. They also carry out a residents' survey and hold engagement events before drawing up a list of issues and priority actions.

Weeks 3 to 9: This is the action bit. Seven weeks of it to be precise. A highly visible presence is on the ground tackling everything from dumped rubbish and dog fouling to housing problems and anti-social behaviour. The team also holds drop-in sessions, giving people the opportunity to seek advice on issues such as housing, energy efficiency and healthy living.

Weeks 10 and 11: This is a time to reflect. Actions are reviewed and any loose ends are tied up before the team moves onto the next area and starts the process all over again.



wardens and housing teams, who work alongside police and community support officers and fire and rescue teams.

While our team members stay involved throughout the programme, they can also call-up support from other partner organisations to tackle any specific problems or issues.

### What happens once the team has left?

An exit strategy is put in place with partners continuing to work on key issues and picking up new ones if they arise. Communities report the positive impact of the team's work can be seen and felt long after they have moved on.

### Where are they now?

The team is currently in Newton Aycliffe, after spending 11 weeks in Annfield Plain, Next stop is Deaf Hill, where the team will arrive on 30 September.

They are also advancing technology for energy capture and storage, safeguarding critical national infrastructure from serious cyber threats, and creating applications for the NHS and water infrastructure. These companies not only contribute to the local economy but also trade internationally, showcasing County Durham's expertise on a global stage.

NETPark's success is due to its strong partnerships. Durham University and the Centre for Process Innovation (CPI) work closely with businesses, helping them develop new ideas and turn them into real products.

And the future looks bright for NETPark. A £100 million expansion project is underway, creating space for even more businesses and up to 1,250 new jobs in exciting and innovative fields.

# 'It was love at first sight, the best feeling ever'

Second-time adopters Steven and Robbie speak about their journey to parenthood ahead of National Adoption Week (21 to 27 October).

Steven and Robbie had been together six years when they started the adoption process in 2020 after attending an information event.

Steven said: "We completed the adoption process and just 24 hours after being approved at the panel meeting, Josh was born. It was love at first sight, the best feeling ever. In January 2023, we started the process again, and were matched with Samantha, a newborn baby girl.

"I'd recommend adoption to everyone. The initial phone call is hardest. There's always an element of doubt, but no one wants to you to fail, they want to help you and want what is best for the child.

"There are two things you need during this process – honesty and open mindedness. It's not an easy process, but it is worth it. We didn't know what to expect during the process, but it brought us closer as a couple".

Adopt Coast to Coast, the regional adoption agency for the council, and Together for Children (Sunderland), is calling for more people to explore adoption as a way to start or grow their families.




We're delighted to welcome journalist, novelist and screenwriter **Helen Fielding** to Gala Durham.



# Affordable homes where they are needed

Our £100 million project to deliver hundreds of new affordable homes across County Durham has taken a major step forward, with the appointment of a delivery partner.

We're planning to deliver 500 affordable homes in communities all over the county, for the benefit of local people, and those with a housing need.

It comes as the government is encouraging councils across the country to build more homes amid a national housing crisis. This is seeing not enough properties being built to meet demand – including the need for affordable homes – and many families struggling financially in the wake of recent spikes in inflation and interest rates.

We've now appointed Bishop Auckland firm T Manners to help deliver new homes in County Durham. These houses will be built mainly on land already in our ownership, with the first phase seeing up to 65 properties created across two sites. The programme will also deliver a significant boost for the economy, with investment in County Durham of around £100 million. It will protect existing jobs and create new ones in the construction industry and associated supply chain.



# Selective Licensing of privately rented properties

Since April 2022, private landlords have been required to obtain a licence to legally rent their properties in selected areas of the county.

About 42% of the private rented sector is covered and you can check if a property is included at www.durham.gov.uk/selectivelicensing



The licence fee is a maximum of £555, per property, for the length of the five-year scheme.

### Staying warm, well and hydrated

These simple tips can help keep us all warm and well in the colder months ahead.

- Stay active, remember to dress for the weather and wear shoes with good grip when outside
- Drink at least six to eight mugs of liquid a day, especially warm drinks during cold weather
- ✓ Keep your home between 18°C and 21°C during the day and at least 18°C at night

### Be Wise, Immunise

One of the best ways to protect yourself and those around you from winter illness this year is to get your winter vaccines, including flu and Covid.

The flu vaccine is available to people who are:

- ✓ pregnant
- children (aged two to 16)
- ✓ in clinical risk groups
- ✓ aged 65 years and over
- ✓ care home residents
- carers and health and social care workers
- close contacts of people with compromised immune systems

The Covid vaccine is available to people who are:

- adults aged 65 years and over
- ✓ residents in a care home for older adults
- ✓ aged six months to 64 years in a clinical risk group

This winter, the UK will also be rolling out a vaccine for respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). RSV typically causes mild, coldlike symptoms, however, it can lead to severe lung infections like pneumonia and infant bronchiolitis.

The RSV vaccine will be available to people who:

- ✓ are pregnant
- ✓ turn 75 on or after
  1 September 2024
- ✓ are already aged 75 to 79 on 1 September 2024



Your GP should contact you about flu, Covid and RSV vaccines. If you don't hear from them and think you are eligible, please contact them directly.

# How can your pharmacy help?

NHS

Got an itch? Tummy trouble? Tickly cough? Then head to your local pharmacy.

Pharmacists across the county can offer advice and treatment for many common conditions, including:

- ✓ Sinusitis (12 years+)
- ✓ Sore throat (5 years+)
- ✓ Shingles (18 years+)
- ✓ Earache (1 to 17 years)
- ✓ Impetigo (1 year+)
- ✓ Infected insect bites (1 year+)
- ✓ UTIs (non-pregnant women aged 16 to 64)

They can also help with other issues, such as aches and pains, colds and flu, skin care and more.

Just pop along to your local pharmacy and talk to a health care professional about your illness. They will offer advice and treatment if needed.

Watch out for signs of hypothermia, such as shivering, cold and pale skin, slurred speech, fast breathing, tiredness and confusion. If you think someone is suffering from hypothermia, call 999 immediately.



Falls are a common, but often overlooked, cause of injury.

Around one in three adults over 65 and half of people over 80 will have at least one fall a year.

Older people are more likely to end up in hospital as the result of a fall and if they fall once there's an increased chance that they'll fall again.

It can also cause a person to lose their confidence, become withdrawn, and feel as if they have lost their independence. Monday 16 to Friday 20 September is **Falls Prevention Week**. Here are 10 tips for preventing falls in the home:

- Mop up spillages immediately
- 2. Remove clutter, trailing wires or frayed carpets
- **3** Use non-slip mats and rugs
- Make sure rooms, passages and staircases are well-lit
- Organise your home so that climbing and stretching are kept to a minimum
- **6** Get help to do things you are unable to do safely on your own
- Don't walk on slippery floors in tights or socks and avoid loose-fitting clothes that trail and trip you up
- **8.** Wear well-fitting shoes or slippers that are in good condition and support the ankle
- **9** Take care of your feet and trim toenails regularly
- 10. Try strength and balance exercises

# **200** plus ways to tackle climate change

We're committing to more than 200 actions as part of our ambitious plans to tackle climate change.

Our Cabinet has agreed the council's third **Climate Emergency Response Plan** (CERP3) to help achieve our targets of reducing council emissions by at least 80 per cent by 2030 – and net zero emissions for County Durham by 2045.

CERP3 builds on the first two plans, which have already helped us to achieve a 63 per cent reduction in carbon emissions since 2008/9.

It sets out 239 actions for the next three years to help us meet these targets and do everything we can to protect the planet, including:

- ✓ The continued decarbonisation of council buildings
- ✓ The roll out of electric vehicles within our fleet
- Reducing miles travelled to deliver services through new ways of working
- ✓ The introduction of wind turbines at our Hackworth Road depot
- Increased biodiversity on our open spaces



Countywide actions include public transport improvements, supporting local food growing initiatives, the expansion of renewable energy schemes from our partners and improving access to green job skills and qualifications.

Current projects are also helping the council to make significant monetary savings through more efficient lighting and the production of our own renewable energy. The Street Light LED Replacement Programme, for example, has already saved millions of pounds in unused energy costs and will continue to make further savings.

### **EV** charging boost

A major new scheme to improve electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure in County Durham is underway.

We're working in partnership with Zest to identify an additional 250 charging locations across the county, with the first phase of charging points being installed this month.

By providing more charging points, it is hoped the project will encourage more people to choose electric vehicles, especially the 40 per cent of residents who don't have a driveway.

The project is backed by £7 million from the government's Local EV Infrastructure (LEVI) scheme, while Zest will also invest more than £7 million to provide and operate the charging points, systems and long-term running of the service.

We're offering coffee pod recycling bins at Horden, Potterhouse Lane, Stainton Grove and Tudhoe household waste recycling centres.


The scheme, in partnership with specialist coffee pod recycling service Podback and HW Martins, allows you to drop off both aluminium and plastic pods at the four HWRCs.

Residents don't need to empty out the coffee before recycling them, but the aluminium and plastic pods do need to be separated and placed into the correct bin.

# Meanwhile, on the high street...

Helping our high streets to thrive is a key part of our Towns and Villages programme. We take a closer look at a project that is doing just that, while also supporting small businesses across the county.

It's a sunny Saturday afternoon in Durham City and **Northern Stores & Deli** is bustling with people browsing the shelves of locally produced food and admiring the array of handmade gifts on sale. Others are catching up over a cup of tea and a slice of cake in the café.

Located in the former H&M unit at Prince Bishops Place shopping centre, Northern Stores & Deli was founded by Discovering Durham, a community interest company that brings together small independent producers from around the county. It is one of many organisations to have benefited from the **Meanwhile Uses Fund**.

The scheme, which is funded through our Towns and Villages programme, aims to enhance the vibrancy of high streets by allowing vacant buildings to be used for temporary retail, hospitality and leisure ventures in between tenants. This not only reduces the number of empty shops but allows businesses to test the water by taking on short-term leases.

The scheme also encourages the development of shared retail spaces, and offers funding to help cover rents, business rates and utility charges.

At Northern Stores & Deli, Meanwhile Uses has supported the creation of three full-time jobs and has indirectly helped more than 10 businesses with products on sale at the shop.

Matthew Booth, director of Discovering Durham CIC, said: "The support from the Meanwhile Uses scheme has been crucial for Discovering Durham CIC. Accessing the grant was remarkably straightforward and the ongoing support from the council's community economic development team has had a significant impact on small businesses across County Durham."





### Step back in time

Just a short walk away is another venture that has benefited from the Meanwhile Uses Fund. In July, **Beamish, The Living Museum of the North** opened a pop-up emporium in Prince Bishops Place, where customers can browse traditional gifts and souvenirs, see museum collections and take part in hands-on activities, including an Edwardian selfie studio.

As well as enriching Durham City's retail offer, the emporium is supporting Beamish's work to preserve the region's heritage for future generations and help today's communities through its health and wellbeing programme and learning activities.





### The perfect gift

In Newton Aycliffe, the Meanwhile Uses Fund helped the owners of **Just The Perfect Gift** to bring their hand-crafted, personalised gift business to the town centre.

June and Robert Howarth took over the old Occasions gift shop on a short-term lease in February and received grants to help cover service charges and utility bills. The business has proven a great success, and they are now extending the lease.

The Meanwhile Uses Fund is just one of the ways we are enhancing the vibrancy of our town and village centres.

### **Retail Start Up Grants**

Funded by the **UK Shared Prosperity Fund**, our Retail Start Up Grants support retail and hospitality businesses in their first six months of trading, providing grants to help cover costs such as rent, business rates, service charges, utilities and insurance.

Businesses that have received grants include: **Cork & Coffee** in Seaham, **White Room** in Stanley, **NuMe** in Shildon, **Notch** in Durham City, **TIDE** in Seaham, **Morano** in Chester-le-Street and **TEN Barbers** in Tow Law.

### **Targeted Business Improvement Scheme**

The Targeted Business Improvement Scheme offers funding to help improve business premises and bring derelict buildings or underused retail units back into use.





The owners have transformed a long-term empty unit on Silver Street into the café's new home, safeguarding 12 jobs and creating an additional four full time positions.


